## Guidelines for the export of pet birds from the US to Japan

- The full requirements for traveling with pet birds are described in the health certificate. The following statements must be met:
  - 1. At the time of shipment, the bird(s) show(s) no clinical signs of West Nile fever, highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) or low pathogenic avian influenza (LPAI).
  - 2. The bird(s) were kept for the past 21 days or from hatching in an "embarkation quarantine facility"\* where measures are taken to prevent entry of mosquitoes.
  - 3. The bird(s) originate from regions/zone\*\* free of HPAI and LPAI as designated by Minister of Health, Labor and Welfare of Japan.

\*Pet birds must be quarantined (isolated) in a facility that prevents free-entry of mosquitoes for at least 21 days before travel. Examples of acceptable facilities include:

- Home where unscreened windows are kept closed and doors are only opened for entry and exit.
- An outdoor cage/ area with sealing doors and mosquito-proof screening.

\*\* Japan requires that birds originate from a region/zone free of HPAI and LPAI. Please visit the Japan Ministry of Health, Labor, and Welfare website (List of designated regions for birds) for information on restricted regions/zones.

- APHIS endorsement of the health certificate is required after it has been issued by a USDA Accredited Veterinarian.
